 - Utilized to “vape” multiple substances
 - Enforcement challenges



Threats to the Clean Indoor Air Act

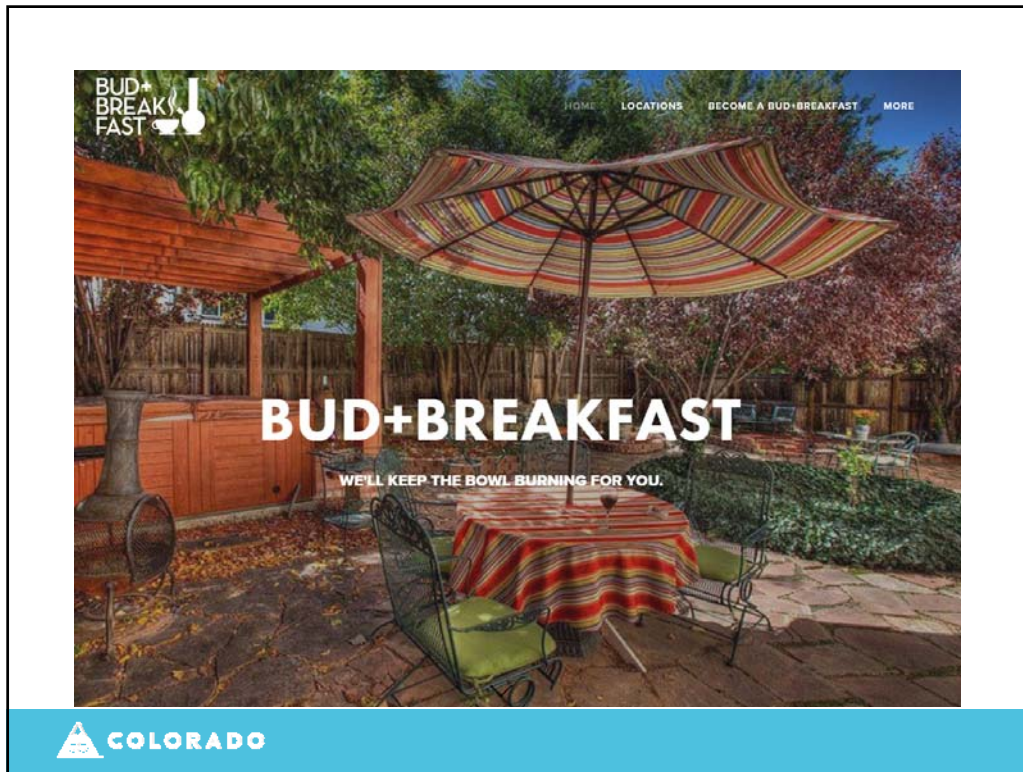
Current exemptions & lack of specificity in recreational marijuana regulations

- A64 does not permit or deny local authority
- CIAA exempts businesses that are not open to the public and have three or fewer employees
- CIAA exempts up to 25% of hotel/motel rooms
- CIAA exempts limousines

Threats to the Clean Indoor Air Act

- SB17-063
 - Proposed to allow local jurisdiction to permit marijuana consumption clubs
 - Sought to exempt these clubs from the CIAA thereby allowing for combustible marijuana to be smoked indoors
 - Defeated in committee on 3/1/17



Threats to the Clean Indoor Air Act

- SB17-184
 - Would allow local jurisdictions to permit marijuana consumption clubs in which marijuana could be vaped and/or eaten
 - Proposes to allow local jurisdictions to create exemptions to the definition of “open and public”
 - Passed 25-10 out of the State Senate on 3/9/17
 - Passed out of House Finance Committee on 3/20/17



Threats to the Clean Indoor Air Act

- Denver Initiative 300
 - Passed by 53.6% of Denver voters in November 2016
 - Allows most businesses to apply for a one-year or event-specific permit for marijuana consumption areas
 - Allows for vaping and edibles indoors
 - Allows for smoking outdoors provided it is out of sight
 - Business would need the backing of local neighborhood or business group



Recommendations and lessons learned

- Protect provisions within clean indoor air laws
- Remove exemptions from clean indoor air laws
- Regulate the use of electronic smoking devices
 - Regulate the product, not the content, to simplify enforcement
- Clearly define public use
- Utilize lessons learned from tobacco control
- Engage political power brokers



“We went to an amazing amount of trouble to say that we are not going to have smoking in workplaces in Colorado,” he said, suggesting allowing pot smoke inside is a “crack in the door.”
